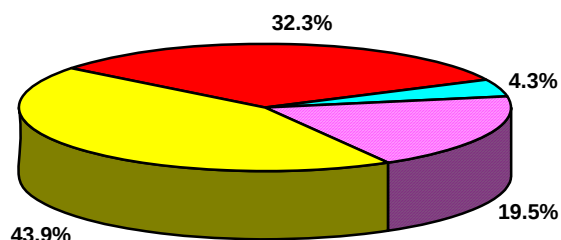

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TRENDS

Since the last 60-Day Report of Registration during a presidential election year (September 3, 2004):

- The total voter registration in the state has increased from 15,625,180 to 16,171,772.
- The percentage of the total number of registered voters compared to the number of people who were eligible to register to vote has decreased from 70.9% to 69.8%.
- The percentage of voters who have declined to state their political party has increased from 17.1% to 19.5%.
- The percentage of people registered with a qualified political party has declined from 82.3% to 79.8%.
- The percentage of voters registered with the Democratic Party increased from 43.2% to 43.9%.
- The percentage of voters registered with the Republican Party declined from 35.0% to 32.3%.
